In the 50's he took me deer hunting with the Morgan Family in Holden canyon. We slept in a big 20 X 20 army tent and when we got up in the morning, there was 3" of new snow. But a nice wood stove made us very comfortable. Another year, he and I were walking down a ridge at Mt. Nebo, when we saw several deer on the opposite side of the canyon. Being 3-400 yds. away, he said, "too far". I said, "I'll give it a try". I rested my trusty Saddle Rifle, a Winchester model 94, on a dead sagebrush, took a bead, raised the front sight about 3 or 4 inches and squeezed off a shot. To both of our surprise, the lead deer took a head-over tail tumble into the oak bushes. All the way over to the other side, I tried to convince Don to take the Doe I had just downed so I could continue the rest of the season looking for a buck. After a short search, we spotted the most beautiful 4-point buck I had ever seen. He said, "Do you still want me to take him home for you?". "No thanks, I think I will take him home." I noticed that my shot had hit him right in the eye. "Not a bad shot, for a kid.....". When we left Alaska, we were looking for career direction, we met with Don and toured some of the homes he had under construction. The seeds were planted that grew to become Overson Cost. Co. which would serve me and my family for many years. He influenced me in many things. I enjoyed the long phone calls and occasional visits. He always tried to join us whenever his older sister, my Mom, held a family reunion. We enjoyed his tales of "the good-ole days. Uncle Don was aa good man and will be missed.
